2022 was an ambitious and impressive year for WCC—a period of growth during which our **Civic Matters** initiative continued to thrive and disrupt systemic barriers to civic engagement for historically underrepresented and disenfranchised women in NYC. We refined and expanded our programming, created and unveiled new opportunities for learning, and increased equitable civic participation. We welcomed many new, committed, and dynamic women to the WCC community.

Our participants gained knowledge and valuable tools to take civic action and create change! WCC also remained active on the policy front, championing and supporting mission-aligned policies—such as voter rights—and continued to build synergistic alliances and partnerships.

At WCC, 2022 also was a year of transitions. We were sad to bid farewell to our outgoing President & CEO, Carole J. Wacey, who led WCC during a critical period—steering the organization through a strategic planning process that resulted in our new name, vision, mission, and program focus. Upon Carole's departure, WCC was fortunate to have former WCC board member, Margaret A. Caspler, step in as Interim President & CEO. Finally, we began a recruitment process to find WCC's next visionary leader, who will join us in 2023 and take the organization to new heights. We cannot wait to introduce our new CEO to this powerful community.

WCC needs generous supporters and champions like you to do this work. I am excited to tell you more about our impact and invite you to stay informed of what is coming next for WCC in 2023—including the launch of our Civic Matters Hub, an online learning and civic engagement platform, and the Civic Matters Fellowship for future women civic leaders.

THE WORKSHOP DESIGN TEAM: FOR WOMEN, BY WOMEN

A core principle of the Civic Matters program is that participants are co-creators of our programs. The Workshop Design Team (WDT) fulfills this promise.

Often, women are looking to make an impact in their communities but are unsure where to start. The WDT provides space for those who want to learn, gain leadership skills, and make a difference.

About the Workshop Design Team (WDT)

The WDT allows for our workshops to be built with specific attention to the variety of needs and lifestyles each woman brings into the space. We have accomplished this by developing a community-led curriculum and providing exciting, collaborative leadership opportunities for New York City women.

WCC offers a series of interactive WDT sessions where previous workshop participants gather to shape the direction of the workshop program. As participants, women become full collaborators in co-developing the future of the Civic Matters Workshop Series, including reflecting on previous workshops and making decisions about future topics, goals, outreach, and materials.

In 2022, nine WDT participants were given the responsibility to collaboratively redesign the WCC Civic Matters "Introduction to Civic Engagement" Community Workshop. The team also helped to facilitate the newly designed workshop.

2022 Highlights:

- + The WDT successfully created a revamped workshop and helped to facilitate its debut.
- + Women gained more professional experience and could add "designing and implementing workshops" to their resumes.
- + Women met and shared ideas with other amazing women in a safe, virtual space and grew their communities and networks.



WCC and Citizens Union held a virtual training focused on redistricting and showcased resources that civically-minded people can use to understand redistricting.




It's Your Money:

Communities Speak: Rebuilding the Post-Pandemic City Through Community Engagement

WCC hosted a Civic Matters Instagram Live where we welcomed Kaitlyn Nelson, the Reports & Digital Team Lead of Communities Speak, a Columbia University research project that aims to rebuild the post-pandemic city through community engagement. The event unveiled initial findings from the Communities Speak Survey, including a crisis in childcare affordability and accessibility that causes particular harm to Black and Hispanic families.

History Matters

In March, 2022, WCC was invited to speak at the commemoration of "Frances Perkins Place," honoring founding WCC Member and labor activist, Frances Perkins. A public advocate in New York City, Perkins became the first female Cabinet Member as the U.S. Secretary of Labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt and was an architect of the New Deal, Social Security, child labor laws, the minimum wage, fair labor standards, and other fundamental public rights and benefits.

It is a reminder that WCC's activist roots lie deep in the heart of New York City—and that legacy is alive and continues to inspire the present, 107 years later.

WCC's staff and Board members joined numerous high-profile New York City and State representatives for the public presentation re-naming West 46th Street between 9th and 10th Avenues in Manhattan, where Perkins had worked at a settlement house and to establish public education. WCC former Chair and current Counsel, Helen Diana (Heidi) Reavis, Esq., spoke movingly about the inspiring legacy of Perkins, whose impact on labor rights, public safety, education, and women's rights are still felt today.

"In honoring Frances Perkins, it is our responsibility to strive towards the goals that she embodied—including ensuring all New York City women have the same opportunities to create change and engage in civic life."
